A Letter From Our CEO



When I reflect on 2025, I do not think first about budgets, trucks, furniture, or even the thousands of items that moved through our doors. I **think about home**.

I think about the mother sitting at a kitchen table with her children for the first time in months. I think about the child climbing into their own bed at night. I think about the family that finally feels settled after months—or years—of uncertainty. **At New Life Furniture Bank, that is why we exist.**

Every day, we help individuals and families transform a housing placement into a home. Because while securing housing is a critical milestone, an empty apartment is not the same thing as stability. Home begins when a family has a place to sleep, gather, eat, learn, heal, and build a future together.

In many ways, 2025 tested our organization. Like many nonprofits across our region, we experienced significant funding disruptions that affected referral agencies and reduced demand for services. The year required difficult decisions, careful stewardship, and a willingness to adapt. Early in the year, we implemented a Minimally Viable Operations Plan to protect the mission, strengthen our financial position, and ensure that New Life Furniture Bank would remain a reliable resource for families who needed us most.

What I witnessed throughout those challenges was extraordinary. Our staff embraced change with resilience and determination. Our volunteers continued to show up week after week. Our donors, partners, and sponsors stepped forward with generosity and confidence. Together, we proved that even during uncertain times, our community remains deeply committed to ensuring that every family has access to a furnished home.

Because of that collective commitment, New Life Furniture Bank furnished 2,065 homes, served 4,680 individuals,

maintained a 97% core furniture fill rate, and expanded partnerships to more than 100 social service agencies throughout the region. We continued to grow our impact in the Greater Dayton area, strengthened our financial foundation, and ended the year in a stronger position than many believed possible.

Yet the numbers tell only part of the story. Behind every delivery is a family beginning a new chapter. Behind every volunteer shift is someone choosing to invest in their neighbors. Behind every furniture donation is an act of generosity that helps create stability, dignity, and hope.

As we look ahead, we remain focused on a simple but powerful vision: ensuring that every individual and family has the opportunity to turn a house into a home.

Thank you for making that vision possible.

Thank you for believing that furniture matters because people matter.

Thank you for standing alongside us as we continue this important work.

Jason's full Story

Beyond His Wildest Dreams

For most of his life, Jason faced obstacles few of us can imagine. On his own at 17 years old, he experienced homelessness before serving a 10-year prison sentence. When he returned home, he was determined to build a better future for his wife and children.

After years of hard work and perseverance, Jason achieved a lifelong dream—becoming a homeowner. But after paying for the house and needed repairs, there was little left to furnish it.

Through New Life Furniture Bank's *Design with a Heart* program, volunteer interior designer Christine Combs transformed Jason's empty house into a warm, welcoming home. Thoughtfully selected furniture and personal touches created a space where his family could finally feel safe, comfortable, and at peace.

For Jason, the transformation was overwhelming. "Coming back now, it's like something you'd see in a magazine,"

he said. "I feel at peace. I feel relaxed. I'm happy. This is beyond my wildest dreams."

The impact was especially meaningful for his children, who finally had bedrooms of their own—including a Spider-Man-themed room for his youngest son.

As a New Life Furniture Bank employee, Jason has helped countless families receive furniture. But experiencing the mission personally gave him a new perspective.

"Now that I'm on the receiving end, it's even more real," Jason shared. "I know where the furniture is going. It's going to a family like mine who really needs it. It's a real blessing."

Every donated bed, sofa, table, and dollar helped transform Jason's house into a home—providing dignity, stability, and hope for a family that never gave up.

The Power of Quiet Dedication

For more than three years, Lynn Meiners has been one of New Life Furniture Bank's most dedicated volunteers. While much of our work focuses on furnishing homes, Lynn has found her own unique way to make a lasting impact—through recycling.

Each year, Lynn contributes more than 1,000 volunteer hours sorting recyclable materials and personally transporting them to recycling partners throughout the community. Day after day, she carefully separates items that cannot be used or sold, ensuring they are responsibly recycled rather than sent to a landfill.

It's work that happens largely behind the scenes. Most donors and families never see the countless hours Lynn spends sorting materials, loading her vehicle, and making trips to recycling centers. Yet her efforts play a vital role in advancing New Life Furniture Bank's commitment to sustainability and stewardship.

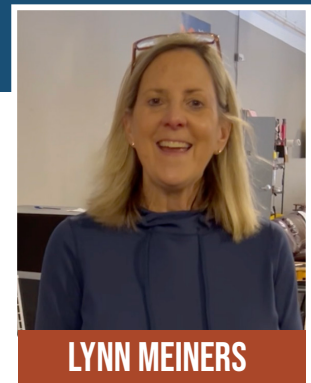
Thanks to Lynn's dedication, thousands of pounds of materials are diverted from local landfills each year. Cardboard, metal, textiles, and other reusable materials

From Dorm Room Desk to Fresh Start

When New Life Furniture Bank received a donation of nearly 300 dorm room desks from Miami University, we saw more than furniture—we saw opportunity.

While generous, the donation presented a challenge. Most families we serve are rebuilding their lives in small apartments and modest homes where space is limited. A desk, while useful, is often not a priority when a family is furnishing an entire home.

Rather than letting the desks go unused, New Life Furniture Bank turned to a trusted group of problem-solvers: the Hope Builders woodworking volunteers.

For more than a decade, these skilled volunteers have been an essential part of our mission. Working alongside community volunteers, they have helped build more than 10,000 tables for families overcoming homelessness, poverty, domestic violence, and other life-changing circumstances. Their expertise has helped transform empty houses into homes.

This time, they took on a different challenge. Using their creativity and craftsmanship, the team

reimagined the solid oak desks as functional storage units. By repurposing portions of each desk, volunteers created stylish dressers featuring multiple drawers and shelving—furniture that better meets the needs of the families we serve.

The result is more than a piece of furniture. It's practical storage for clothing, household items, and personal belongings. It's a way for a family to stay organized as they begin a new chapter. It's dignity, stability, and comfort delivered through innovation.

Just as importantly, this project gave new life to nearly 300 pieces of furniture that might otherwise have gone unused or ended up in a landfill. Through the ingenuity of dedicated volunteers, a generous donation was transformed into hundreds of furnishings that will help families create homes for years to come.

At New Life Furniture Bank, we believe every piece of furniture has a purpose. Thanks to the Cincinnati Woodworking Club, 300 dorm room desks became hundreds of opportunities for families to build a brighter future.

A House Becomes A Home

The phone rang early that morning. On the other end was Robert, a veteran and recent recipient of furniture from New Life Furniture Bank. He wasn't calling to ask for help. He was calling to say thank you. "I just want to say what an outstanding organization you have," he shared. "And I want to know what I can do to help."

For Robert, that call represented far more than gratitude. It represented a new beginning. After serving as a combat Marine, Robert faced difficult circumstances that eventually led him through nearly five years in a homeless veterans shelter. Like many individuals rebuilding their lives, he worked hard to secure stable housing. But moving into a home is only part of the journey. A house without furniture can still feel empty. "You don't have much when you don't have any furniture," Robert explained. "There's kind of an empty space—a place to go to."

When Robert was referred to New Life Furniture Bank, he tried to keep his expectations modest. "I told them I just needed a few things," he recalled. "A table, a chair, and a bed." What arrived was far more than he imagined.

New Life Furniture Bank's delivery team furnished his home with a sofa, tables, chairs, kitchen essentials, and everything needed to create a comfortable living space.

"I was overwhelmed," Robert said. "I expected a loveseat, and I got a whole room full of furniture."

For the first time in years, Robert could sit

at his own table, enjoy a cup of coffee, and read a book. Friends had a place to gather. Conversations could happen around a table instead of standing in an empty room. Most importantly, he finally had a bed of his own.

After years of sleeping in shelters alongside dozens of other people, the simple gift of a comfortable queen-sized bed brought something many of us take for granted: rest.

"Now that I have my own place and a beautiful bed, it's a lot easier to lay your head down at night."

For veterans like Robert, the transition from military service to civilian life can be challenging. Stable housing is an important milestone, but transforming that housing into a home is what creates the foundation for healing, independence, and hope. "New Life provided the things that I needed to get back on my feet," Robert shared.

Today, Robert's home is filled with more than furniture. It is filled with comfort, peace, and the opportunity to welcome others into his life.

His story is a reminder that every donated sofa, every table, every bed, and every dollar given helps create something much bigger than a furnished room. It creates a place where someone can finally rest, gather, heal, and belong. As Robert put it best:

"Thank you, New Life Furniture Bank, for making my house a home."

MORE THAN JUST A THRIFT STORE

Every day, people walk through the doors of New Life Furniture Bank's Thrift Store for different reasons.

Some are furnishing a first apartment on a tight budget. Some are young families stretching every dollar. Others are college students starting out, or neighbors simply looking for quality furniture they can afford.

What they all find is the same thing: access to affordable furniture and household goods that make a house feel like home.

For many families, purchasing furniture new is simply out of reach. A sofa, dining table, dresser, or set of kitchen chairs can quickly cost hundreds or even thousands of dollars. At New Life Furniture Bank's Thrift Store, shoppers can find quality, gently used furnishings at prices that fit their budgets, helping them create comfortable, functional homes without financial strain.

But the impact doesn't stop with the shopper. Every item in the store began with a donor who chose a sustainable alternative to sending furniture to a landfill. Instead of paying for disposal or watching usable furniture go to waste, donors give their items a second life. A dining table hosts new

family meals. A sofa becomes the centerpiece of another living room. A dresser helps someone organize a fresh start. This cycle of reuse creates a powerful environmental impact. Each year, New Life Furniture Bank diverts 1,000 tons of furniture and household goods from local landfills, reducing waste while maximizing the value of items that still have years of life left in them.

The Thrift Store also serves a greater purpose. Revenue generated through sales directly supports New Life Furniture Bank's mission of furnishing homes for families overcoming homelessness, domestic violence, poverty, and other life-changing circumstances. Every purchase helps fuel deliveries, provide beds for children, and furnish homes for neighbors rebuilding their lives.

When someone donates a couch, shops for a lamp, or purchases a dining table, they become part of something bigger than a transaction. They are helping create a community where resources are shared, waste is reduced, and more families have access to the comfort and dignity of a furnished home. At New Life Furniture Bank's Thrift Store, furniture doesn't reach the end of its story—it begins a new one.

The family returned to find fully furnished rooms, an electric fireplace, a beautifully decorated Christmas tree, and gifts waiting for the children. What they received was more than furniture. It was a celebration of a mother's hard work, a fresh start for her family, and the opportunity to create new memories together.



Measuring What Matters

PROVIDED A GENEROUS \$100,000 GRANT TO NEW LIFE FURNITURE BANK



When team members from Michelman volunteered at New Life Furniture Bank, they saw firsthand how donated furniture transforms empty houses into homes. They witnessed volunteers in action,

learned about the families served, and experienced the mission up close. That experience inspired something extraordinary.

As part of Michelman's 75th Anniversary Celebration, employees were invited to nominate organizations making a meaningful impact in the community. After volunteering with New Life Furniture Bank, **Michelman selected New Life as the recipient of a generous \$100,000 grant.** The gift is helping New Life Furniture Bank answer an important question: How does furniture impact a family's well-being?

For years, New Life has seen the emotional reactions of families receiving beds, tables, sofas, and household essentials. Parents express relief. Children are excited to have a bed of their own. Families describe feeling dignity, comfort, and hope. But until now, those outcomes have

largely been measured through stories.

Thanks to Michelman's investment, New Life is conducting an impact study to better understand how furniture affects the mental, physical, and emotional health of the families it serves. The study will explore questions related to sleep quality, stress levels, social connection, stability, and overall well-being after families receive furniture and household goods.

By collecting this data, New Life hopes to deepen its understanding of how a furnished home contributes to healthier, stronger families and to share those findings with partners, donors, and communities across the country.

Michelman's gift is helping New Life do more than furnish homes. It is helping demonstrate the lasting impact of dignity, comfort, and belonging.

Together, Michelman and New Life Furniture Bank are measuring what matters most: how a home can help transform a life. "Michelman's investment is helping New Life measure not just what is delivered, but how lives are changed." - Dana Saxton, CEO of NLFB.
